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


Below are the new behaviour zones. We expect all students to be working in the green zone (I.e '**The GA Way**').

- Pace and Purpose work hard within lessons and move around school calmly and with purpose.

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


### Amber Zone

- Both within lessons and outside lessons there are some behaviours we will not tolerate.
- These behaviours will result in a **log** or **referral** being sanctioned.
- At this point you have a **choice** to make
  - an improvement in behaviour will result in moving towards the **green** zone and a positive outcome for the remainder of the lesson.
  - continued poor behaviour will result in moving towards or into the **red** zone and possible further sanctions.

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## Red Zone 🗙

- Both within lessons and outside lessons there are behaviours which we will absolutely not tolerate under any circumstances.
- These behaviours will result in a in any of the following:
  - 1) SLT detention
  - 2) Reflection Room
  - 3) Headteacher detention
  - 4) Suspension

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## Uniform

Uniform will be checked at the schools gates every morning by SLT.

Every student must make sure they follow the uniform rules below:

- School shoes not black trainers.
- Shirts tucked in.
- Skirts unrolled.
- Any hoodies to be confiscated and left either at reception of HOY's office.
- No fake nails.
- Maximum of two studs per ear. No other jewellery can be worn apart from a watch.
- Blazers and ties must be worn. If students are missing either of these they must hand their phone in for a spare. Phones will be left at reception or HOY's office for you to collect at the end of the day.

Students will receive a log if they have been asked to correct their uniform on two or more occasions during the school day.







## **Mobile Phones**

#### Benefits of a phone free environment:

- An improved focus on learning
- Improved mental health and well-being
- Safeguarding the community





Mobile phones and airpods are not permitted to be used at any time by students between **8.25am** and **3.15pm** whilst on school site.

If you are seen wearing/using airpods during the school day we will confiscate your phone, not the airpods.

If a mobile phone is seen or heard it will be confiscated and retained for the remainder of the school day. If the same mobile phone is seen or heard again the following sanctions will apply:

- 2nd offence confiscation on the day and 5 days in signal-blocking phone pouch
- 3rd offence confiscation on the day and 10 days in signal-blocking phone pouch
- 4th offence confiscation on the day and the rest of term in signal-blocking phone pouch

Refusal to hand over your mobile phone will result in time spent in the reflection room. If a student still refuses to hand over their phone after the reflection room they will be suspended from school.

## Positives/Rewards

#### House points:

Students will receive house points automatically through Bromcom for various positive behaviours such as:

- No late logs in a week
- 100% attendance in a week
- No logs in a week

These will accumulate along with house points awarded by staff.

Throughout each half term there will be weeks where some positive behaviours will be worth double house points!

After achieving a certain amount of house points you will receive rewards/prizes. These include:

- Queue jump passes
- Breakfast mornings
- Netballs/Footballs/Basketballs for break times (for you to keep)!
- Pizza afternoons
- Bronze/Silver/Gold flashes

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# **E-Safety in School**

## George Abbot Student Acceptable Use Agreement

- Ensure the safety and security of themselves
  - Respect for all our community
- Maintain the reputation of the school
- Not to use mobiles phones inside school buildings- not to film. School owned, and managed IT devices

- 1.Recognise inappropriate online content, contact and conduct.
- 2.Know how to report issues online (bullying, abuse and harassment).
- 3.Know how to find help in school/ home/ online

5.Responsibilities- Know your rights for keeping safe.

6.Knowing how materials posted online , once shared can go viral

7. Understand that relationships presented online can allow **negative behaviour** to escalate.

8. Understand that sharing and viewing indecent images of children (including those created by children) is a **criminal offence** which carries serious penalties.

9. Understand how information and data is generated, collected, shared and used online Algorithms

10. Understand what **grooming/ abuse may look like** and how to get help

**4.Monitoring and Supervision**: Parents should monitor their children's online activities while respecting their privacy. Tools like parental controls can be helpful to manage internet usage, but it's essential to balance monitoring with trust.

**5.Encourage Critical Thinking**: Teach children to think critically about the information they encounter online, including recognizing misinformation, identifying suspicious behaviour, and understanding the implications of sharing personal information.

## **SEND Support at George Abbot School**

- There are no Learning Support Assistants (LSAs) in class and most students are supported within the class by teachers using Ordinarily Available Provision
- There is a SENCO/Deputy SENCO responsible for SEND in each year group
  - Year 7 jrichings@georgeabbot.surrey.sch.uk
  - Year 8 & 11 <u>eferris@georgeabbot.surrey.sch.uk</u>
  - Year 9 & 10 <u>eboothman@georgeabbot.surrey.sch.uk</u>
- We work with parents and subject teachers to identify and support needs
- Students are assessed and monitored at the start of the year to identify needs and where support is required
- Needs change so our support will adapt accordingly each year
- You will be written to by October half term if we feel your child needs to be added to our SEND Support List

## SEND Support is a graduated approach

- Wave One support
  - Support for students with SEND starts in the classroom this is known as Ordinarily Available Provision, in line with the SEND Code of Practice 2015
  - All teachers are made aware of individual student needs and can adapt their classroom and teaching to meet those needs
  - Additional clubs for students with SEND needs at break times
- Wave Two support
  - Students have a Progress Mentor to check-in on them and liaise with teachers
  - Our team run 1:1 or small group interventions out of the classroom for identified students (these may be short-term or long-term)
  - Support in form time or break times may also be offered
- Wave Three support
  - We work with external agencies to support students
  - We may begin to discuss whether an EHCP is required




## **Exam Support at George Abbot School**

- The process for providing exam access arrangements (EAA) is that we must collect evidence of need from teachers to show students require support regularly in tests. There must also be test evidence and/or a diagnosis of a SEND need.
- Formal application of EAA can only happen from Year 9 onwards for use in GCSEs and we must apply again at Sixth Form.



- Improved efficiency of workflow.








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#### **Student Access**

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#### **Identified Issues**

#### Some parents reported that they did not receive the school bulletin.

We have worked with Bromcom and changed the email server. Some users' email client has been identified as blocking the email, so users have been advised to check Junk, Trash and Spam folders as well as removing all blocks.

#### Some parents reported that they are now unable to login into MCAS app.

The users who have reported this are able to access the Parent Web Portal. A senior member of the Learning Partners Network team is working with the Bromcom software team to resolve this.
