## New opportunity for your child to learn a musical instrument

- Thursdays, 3.30pm - 4.30pm: Saxophone



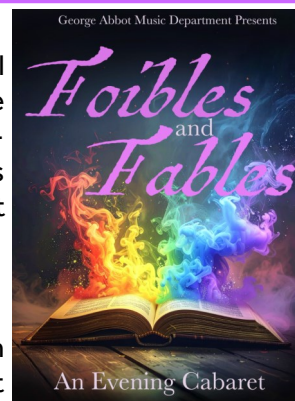

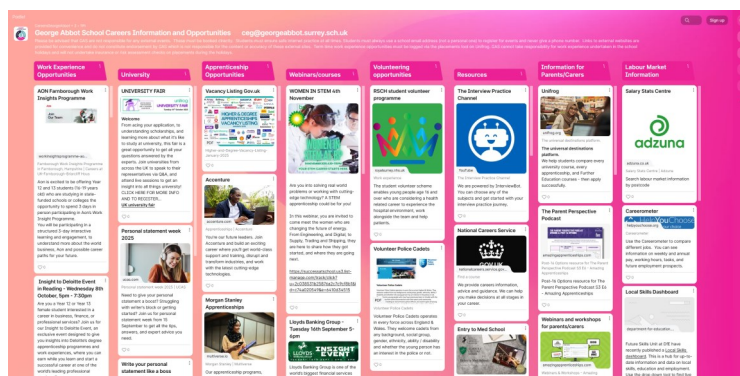

Please be reminded that school will be closing at **1.35pm on Tuesday 10 March** for us to conduct the Year 9 Parents' Evening. When the Parents' Evening is for a year group other than their own, students are expected to complete work set independently at home during the afternoon. This work will be set via Bromcom and/or the SLE. Provision has been made for students who are unable to go home at this time. If you wish for your son/daughter to remain supervised in school, please let us know by emailing curriculum@georgeabbot.surrey.sch.uk by close of school on Monday 9 March. It is vital that we are forewarned of those who will be in attendance.

If you notify us that your child will be remaining in school and your arrangements change, it is essential that you let us know of the change before 12.00pm on the day. **Where we have been notified that a student will be remaining in school, if they fail to arrive and register with Mrs Cordery in Student Support in Moloney building, you will be contacted by a truancy call alert from our attendance system. Therefore, it is important that they register with Mrs Cordery in Student Support in Moloney Building at 2.00pm if you have notified us that your son/daughter is remaining in school.**

Please be reminded that school buses will run at the usual times.

⇒ **Cycle and Traffic Safety**

Following feedback from local residents, and members of the public, we would like to draw your attention to the concerns raised about traffic safety, with particular concerns regarding Great Goodwin Drive, Charlock Way and Woodruff Avenue. Please could we remind parents/carers:

- Please do not park on pavements or in the cycle lanes when dropping off or picking up children.
- Please do not drive in the cycle lane while queuing to leave Woodruff Avenue at the roundabout, this makes it unpassable for cyclists. This is particularly dangerous for students who ride bicycles to and from school.
- When parking, we ask you to be considerate to others and ensure residents' driveways are left clear.
- Please could all road users take care to ensure that the safety of pedestrians is paramount. Do ensure you allow enough time for your journey to school and drop off in a safe area.
- Please always treat our neighbours and members of our community with politeness and respect at all times.

Please could we ask for your support in reminding your child that:

- Cycling on pavements can put members of our community at risk, including young children, elderly residents and those with mobility or visual impairments. Students should always use designated cycle lanes or ride safely on the road.
- When cycling in shared or busy areas, students should slow down, give plenty of space, and be prepared to stop. Courtesy and awareness help keep everyone safe.
- Cyclists are expected to follow the same road rules as other road users—this includes obeying traffic lights, giving way appropriately, and signalling clearly.
- Headphones and mobile phones should not be used when cycling—awareness of what's going on around you is vital.

## Sports Round Up

Since returning after Christmas, we have been absolutely delighted with the level of enthusiasm, commitment and success shown across our extra-curricular clubs and fixtures. The past half term has been particularly busy for cross-country, basketball and football, with some excellent performances to celebrate. We are equally excited to see the return of netball fixtures after the half term and look forward to another successful half term of sport.

### Football:

Year 7 girls beat Christ's College 3-0 at home.

U13 girls made their way to the second round of the National Cup after a win against Blessed Hugh Faringdon School and a goal from the halfway line. They face the Fareham Academy after half term.

U16 girls got through to the last 16 of the National Cup, taking penalties (again) but winning after 3 saves against Sanders Drapers. The girls then faced Surbiton High (reining champions), missing out on a place in the quarter finals 2-0.

Year 7 boys played St Peter's at home, finishing 5-5.

Year 10B boys travelled to play Glebelands, proving to be worthy winners despite the rain.



### Netball:

Year 7 and Year 8 both won friendly games against Broadwater.

### Basketball:

Year 7 girls played three teams against Glebelands, with an overall draw result.

Year 8 girls finished 3rd at a Surrey basketball tournament. The team travelled to the Woking District tournament winning 4/4 games against some tough competition.

Year 7 boys won their first Surrey League game at Rutlish School, 26-18. Then played Richard Challoner School, losing 36-26 in a tight game. In the Surrey League, facing Chessington in a tight game, the boys lost 25-23.

Year 8 boys played Glebelands, taking a 34-21 win.

Year 9 boys had a great win (64-45) against Gordons, moving them to 2nd in the Surrey League. The team then faces Hollyfield, winning 49-37.

U16 boys lost 53-58 to St Bedes with only a few regular team players.

### Rugby:

Year 7 boys played Cranmore School, in a tightly contested game, losing 5-3 in the end.

### Cricket:

George Abbot hosted the U13 Boys indoor Surrey Plate, demonstrating some fantastic cricket.

U15 boys took part in the Surrey Indoor semi finals day, finishing 2nd after some good performances.



### Cross Country:

A fantastic day with all year groups represented at the Surrey Schools Athletics. Highlights include U13 boys 5th, Junior girls 8th and 11th, Junior boys 11th and 19th, Inter boys 2nd and 6th, Senior girls 5th and 10th.

The South East England School cross country championships had five GA students, Hope K finished in 3rd place.

### Sports Hall Athletics:

Both the year 7 girls and boys teams won the Sports Hall Athletics event hosted by Woolmer Hill, progressing to the county finals in March.

### Swimming:

A full squad of 30 girls and boys across year 7-13 competed at the Surrey Schools Swimming Championships. Highlights include Junior girls 200m IM 1st, Junior girls 100m Fly 2nd, Inter girls 100m Breast 2nd, Senior Girls 100m Breast 2nd, Senior girls 100m Fly 2nd. Inter boys 100m Free 2nd, Senior boys 100m Back 3rd, Senior boys 200m IM 3rd.

## Safer Internet Day—smart tech, safe choices – exploring the safe and responsible use of AI

AI technology is increasingly part of all our lives, so this Safer Internet Day we are starting a conversation about how to use it safely and responsibly. The [children's commissioner report](#), recently published, highlights the need for good digital habits that support mental health, wellbeing and sleep. Having phone free zones such as at dinner or the bedroom will help to build in healthy digital habits promoting better sleep, improved mental health and lowered levels of anxiety associated with smart technology. ### **Top Tips**

#### **Enjoy going online together and talk regularly about your family's online lives**

The internet is amazing and can help us all to access information and entertainment. Spend time online with your child to understand how they are using technology and talk together about the good and the bad parts of being online. Talk about your own experiences and find other opportunities to get the conversation started, like stories in the news. Make sure your child knows they can talk to you about anything that they see or experience online.

#### **Understand where AI technology is being used and the impact it can have**

From summaries on search engines, to voice assistants and photo editing tools, AI powered features are being added to many of the apps and devices we use day-to-day. Look out for information and warnings notifying you where AI technology is in use or where content has been created using AI. Help your child to recognise these too. Remember, AI can make some tasks simpler but may also collect data about you and your family, or share unreliable information, so consider how to use it safely and responsibly.

#### **Recognise what safe and responsible use of technology looks like**

To use technology, including AI, safely and responsibly, it's important to reflect on the potential impact it can have on yourself and others. How does your use of technology make you feel? How can you use technology with kindness and respect for others? Does your use of technology benefit you or help you build skills? How might it affect you now, and in the future? Ask these questions of your own internet use, as well as your family's.

#### **Stay informed with free resources**

Young people have told us about the incredible ways they're using AI, but also about their worries for what it means for the future. Issues such as the environmental impact of AI, what it means for job prospects, and the threat of deepfakes can seem scary but remember, you don't need to have all the answers. Stay informed using free resources like those produced for Safer Internet Day and talk to your child about their concerns about new technology – you can always work together to find more information.

#### **Know where to go for help if something goes wrong**

Like any technology, using AI comes with risks. Some AI tools, like ChatGPT, have built-in reporting features where you can raise issues such as inappropriate or harmful content. Many social media platforms also allow you to report content you suspect has been created with AI. Additionally, AI generated content can break the law. If you see illegal images that show child sexual abuse (including AI generated images), you should report these to the IWF and on the platform where they are being shared. If someone creates an image of you or your child using AI these can also be reported on the platform where they are being shared, and AI generated nude images can be reported to Stop NCII (for images of adults) and Report Remove or Take It Down (for images of under 18s).

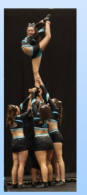
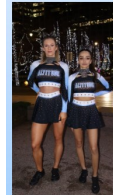

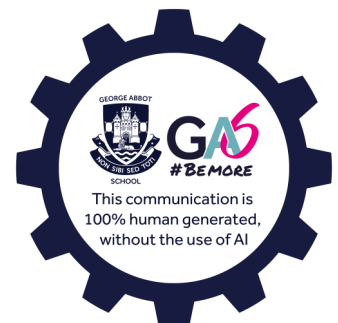
